## Ruth Meets Boaz in the Grain Field

2 Now Naomi had a relative on her husband's side, a man of standing from the clan of Elimelek, whose name was Boaz.

<sup>2</sup> And Ruth the Moabite said to Naomi, “Let me go to the fields and pick up the leftover grain behind anyone in whose eyes I find favor.”

## Leviticus 19:9-10

9 “When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. 10 Do not go over your vineyard a second time or pick up the grapes that have fallen. Leave them for the poor and the foreigner. I am the Lord your God.”

<sup>4</sup> Just then Boaz arrived from Bethlehem and greeted the harvesters, “The LORD be with you!”

“The LORD bless you!” they answered.

<sup>5</sup> Boaz asked the overseer of his harvesters, “Who does that young woman belong to?”

## Deuteronomy 10:18-19

“He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the foreigner residing among you, giving them food and clothing. *And you are to love those who are foreigners, for you yourselves were foreigners in Egypt.*”

<sup>11</sup> Boaz replied, “I’ve been told all about what you have done for your mother-in-law since the death of your husband—how you left your father and mother and your homeland and came to live with a people you did not know before.

<sup>12</sup> May the LORD repay you for what you have done. May you be richly rewarded by the LORD, the God of Israel, under whose wings you have come to take refuge.”

13 “May I continue to find favor in your eyes, my lord,” she said. “You have put me at ease by speaking kindly to your servant—though I do not have the standing of one of your servants.”

<sup>14</sup> At mealtime Boaz said to her,  
“Come over here. Have some  
bread and dip it in the wine  
vinegar.”

When she sat down with the  
harvesters, he offered her some  
roasted grain. She ate all she  
wanted and had some left over.

<sup>15</sup> As she got up to glean, Boaz gave orders to his men, “Let her gather among the sheaves and don’t reprimand her. <sup>16</sup> Even pull out some stalks for her from the bundles and leave them for her to pick up, and don’t rebuke her.”

17 So Ruth gleaned in the field until evening. Then she threshed the barley she had gathered, and it amounted to about an ephah.[\[a\]](#) 18 She carried it back to town, and her mother-in-law saw how much she had gathered.

Ruth also brought out and gave her what she had leftover after she had eaten enough.

<sup>19</sup> Her mother-in-law asked her, “Where did you glean today? Where did you work? Blessed be the man who took notice of you!”

Then Ruth told her mother-in-law about the one at whose place she had been working. “The name of the man I worked with today is Boaz,” she said.

<sup>20</sup> “The LORD bless him!” Naomi said to her daughter-in-law.

“He has not stopped showing his kindness to the living and the dead.” She added, “That man is our close relative; he is one of our guardian-redeemers.[\[b\]](#)”

<sup>21</sup> Then Ruth the Moabite said, “He even said to me, ‘Stay with my workers until they finish harvesting all my grain.’”

<sup>22</sup> Naomi said to Ruth her daughter-in-law, “It will be good for you, my daughter, to go with the women who work for him, because in someone else’s field you might be harmed.”

<sup>23</sup> So Ruth stayed close to the women of Boaz to glean until the barley and wheat harvests were finished. And she lived with her mother-in-law.
